Bickering couple Monigue (Miou-Miou) and Antoine (Michel Blanc) are interrupted by bisexual burglar Bob (Gérard Depardieu) while arguing in a bar. Long before the term LGBT was coined, Gérard Depardieu took a chance with a role exploring gender fluidity and launched into one of the most famous tirades of French cinema. Makes the stars of "La Cage aux Folles" look like they're playing it safe. — Roger Ebert. Mimi Plauché, programming director, and Vivian Teng, managing director, have worked

Céline Sciamma (2015, 113 min. French) With J.P. Anderson, Michigan Avenue Magazine Tuesday, April 18 at 6:30 p.m.

The hood, gangs, school, parents — it's all too much for Marieme, who joins an all-girl gang in the Paris project where she lives. Director Céline Sciamma gets an ultra-natural performance from a non-professional cast energized by a hip hop soundtrack by Para One, an alias of French electro producer Jean-Baptiste de Laubier. This is what happens when a filmmaker shifts the male cinematic gaze ever so slightly and uncovers what looks like a whole new world.

Forget about trashy reality TV and watch the birth of cinéma vérité in one of the most significant documentaries ever made. Sociologist Edgar Morin and anthropologist and filmmaker Jean Rouch, with the technical and aesthetic collaboration of Québécois director-cameraman Michel Brault, interview a group of Paris residents in the summer of 1960 — beginning with the provocative and eternal question "Are you happy?" A document of a time and place with extraordinary emotional depth. Criterion.

A touchstone of the careers of both its star and director, Elevator to the Gallows is a richly atmospheric thriller of murder and mistaken identity unfolding over one restless Parisian night. — Criterion

A curator at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Chicago and a tireless forager of fresh voices, Naomi Beckwith explored Chicago's rich musical heritage in The Freedom Principle: Experiments in Art and Music, 1965 to Now.

Thursday, July 13 at 6:30 p.m.

On the eve of Bastille Day, we remember the last moment of the French aristocracy before the Revolution with a thoroughly contemporary version of Marie-Antoinette's life as the Paris Hilton of the House of Bourbon. Only director Sofia Coppola could get away such an oblique and anachronistic point of view, shifting the balance away from realism and into an act of empathy for a girl swept up by events that leave her without personal choices. - Roger Ebert.
